ANNUAL SECURITY REPORT

2010

In November of 1990, Congress passed the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act, which amended the Higher Education Act of 1965. This act required all postsecondary institutions participating in Title IV programs to disclose security information and campus crime statistics for the three preceding calendar years. It was amended in 1992, 1998 and 2000. The 1998 amendment renamed the law the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (the Clery Act). It was again amended by the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA) of 2008 which now requires disclosure of emergency response policies and evacuation procedures. The HEOA also increased the list of reportable crimes including hate crimes, and requires those additional disclosures to begin with the October 1, 2010 annual security report.

This report is a compilation of the statistics collected from all twelve Academic Centers and local police departments. In October 1998, Congress required colleges and universities to report campus crimes according to location (campus, non-campus, public property) as well as crimes involving manslaughter and arson. Liquor, weapons and drug offense statistics include college disciplinary actions as well as arrests. In 2010 the HEOA requires the reporting of hate crimes in four additional categories; Larceny-Theft, Simple Assault, Intimidation and Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property (except arson).

The Community College of Vermont is committed to providing a safe environment for its students, faculty and staff and has policies that address the crime awareness act, site safety and security, hate crime reporting, emergency response and evacuation procedures, drug and alcohol use, timely warnings, sexual assault and harassment, and the disruptive student. CCV does not employ a campus security force, but fosters a close relationship with local police departments. Incidents that occur at a CCV center, and may be criminal in nature, are reported promptly for investigation by the local law enforcement authority.

The CCV community will be notified of emergency situations by posting alerts at the affected center, on the CCV website and/or portal and by emailing and/or calling the center's student, faculty and staff. Accurate and prompt reporting of all emergencies and criminal incidents, as well as bias motivated incidents, is the responsibility of all CCV community members. Reports should be made to any CCV front desk staff and President's Council member.
