HISTORY OF CCV BURLINGTON

Originally known as the Chittenden site, CCV opened its doors in the Burlington area in the fall of 1982, with a staff of two. The small facility located in the Chace Mill in Burlington housed only one classroom and three small offices. Funded through a Title III grant, the College's 11th location quickly found its niche in the area.

Three years later enrollment had grown to 400 students taking 66 courses with 50 faculty members. This rapid growth precipitated a move to a larger locale almost immediately, and in the fall of 1983 CCV's Chittenden site moved to the Champlain Mill in Winooski, where students enjoyed four spacious classrooms. "We could hardly keep up with all the students coming in," recalls Mica DeAngelis, who had recently been hired as a Coordinator of Academic Services. "I remember bringing chairs from my house for students to use during classes because our facilities simply couldn't grow fast enough."

In 1988 the site once again required expansion, this time moving to Dorset Street in South Burlington. For the first time, students enjoyed an art studio and science lab, as well as the site's first computer lab. Within five years enrollment had doubled to nearly 1,000 students, and in fall of 1993 the CCV Burlington site office on Pearl Street opened its doors. In 1997 CCV incorporated a large portion of the state office building on Cherry Street to house a number of offices, classrooms and two science labs.

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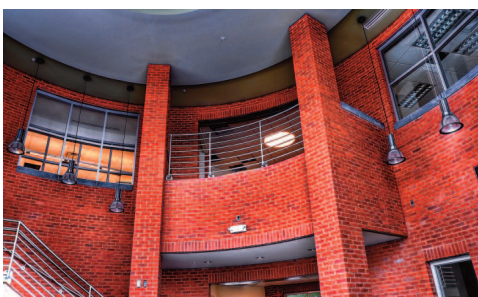

A NEW FACILITY

CCV's new 65,000 square foot facility has been carefully designed to support an active learning community and encourage environmental sustainability. It has 35 classrooms, including five computer classrooms, four science labs and three art studios, as well as a learning center, performance space, and community room.

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It wasn't long before other area institutions began recognizing CCV in Burlington as an asset to the higher education opportunities available to Chittenden County residents. In 1998 an articulation agreement with the University of Vermont would prove pivotal to the future of CCV in Burlington and the College as a whole. For the first time CCV graduates were guaranteed admission to UVM, changing the public perception of CCV. No longer thought of as a rural, second-rate college, CCV began its climb towards the respected reputation it enjoys today as a critical player in the education and workforce development of Vermonters statewide.

Today CCV in Winooski employs 250 faculty and 50 staff and educates over 2,400 students each semester. "Over the past decade, we have seen our Chittenden County enrollment grow by double digits each year," says Regional Director for Academics Dee Steffan. "This facility provides our students and faculty with ample classroom, library and meeting spaces to meet continued growth in enrollment."

As the College moves to a facility designed to meet the changing needs of the Chittenden population, the staff at the Winooski facility will continue focusing on teaching and learning, providing opportunities for all Vermonters to achieve their full potential for college and workforce readiness.
